FY 2022 Arts Grants and Funding Has Increased (7/1/21 to 6/30/22)

We are pleased to let constituents know that our State funding for this fiscal year has increased. Arts grants are available for non-profit arts organizations, community groups and schools, that are sponsoring arts activities, in the 9-county area. Deadlines for applying are August 1 and September 1st for our Small Arts Community Project, School Arts Project, or August 1st for the Arts and Cultural Heritage (ACH) Grant.

We encourage new applicants and especially BIPOC artists and BIPOC community focused arts activities to apply as well as activities to benefit people with disabilities, LGBTQ+, youth and seniors. Grant information is on pages 5-6.

In FY 2021 Prairie Lakes awarded 196 Grants totaling \$387,239

Here's a summary of Grants awarded:

\$52,500 - McKnight Artist Grants (35 grants)

\$79,309 - State General funds (24 grants) Small Arts Project & School Grants

\$255,430 - Arts and Cultural Heritage (ACH) (137 grants); 29 organizational grants & 108 Youth Scholarships.

The three categories of **ACH grants** and the amounts awarded were:

- (1) Arts Programming/Arts Access \$213,552, which includes grants to 27 nonprofit arts organizations and community groups, for their arts programs and activities.
- (2) Arts Education \$41,878, which includes 2 school grants and 108 Youth Scholarships of \$300 or \$200 each.
- (3) Arts & Cultural Heritage Festivals \$0; most community festivals were cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The ACH Youth Scholarships for grades 3-6 and 7-12 have deadlines on Oct. 1, and Nov. 1, 2021.

We are estimating that ACH grant funds for organizations will be about \$427,218 in FY 2022 which is a substantial increase. Details are listed below about the Distribution of Funds for the year.

<u>Note</u>: We may not award all of the Arts and Cultural Heritage grant funds and could carry-over some money into FY 2023.



Small Arts Grants Are Available for Arts & Cultural Activities

The Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council has Arts grants available for Black, Indigenous and People of Color led Arts Initiatives, and arts projects for underserved groups, people with disabilities, LGBTQ+, etc., in the 9-county area of southern Minnesota. The purpose of our Arts Grant is to provide funding for non-profit organizations directly engaged in the creation of art, the production of artistic performances or arts services, or the sponsorship of quality arts activities in our local communities. This may include dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art, etc.

The next FY 2022 Small Arts Grant deadlines are September 1 and October 1, 2021. The Small Arts Grant maximum is \$2,000 or \$3,000 for BIPOC projects and underserved Arts activities. Please contact the PLRAC staff to find out if your project is eligible.

The Small Arts Project Grants are made possible by funds provided by the Minnesota State Legislature. **No cash match is required this year.**

In July we were pleased to award \$11,480 in State arts grants to five arts organizations.

American Indian Cultural Events Group - \$3,000. They will provide informal, hands-on activities that teach about Dakota, Ojibwe, and Lakota culture. The three events include an outdoor youth camp to teach sports and history, a storytelling event, and a dance event that includes mini-lessons. The events will take place August through October 2021 in outdoor settings.

American Indian Service Learning Project - \$1,500.

They will coordinate cultural interactive learning experiences for college students and young adults to interact and learn from American Indian artists and speakers at the Mankato Powwow, September 2021. Traditions about music, dance, food, and crafts will be shared.

Armstrong Boulevard Brass Quintet - \$2,000. They will offer ten live music performances for senior citizens, veterans and other members of our population of the ninecounty area that, due to health problems, are confined to full time residence in health facilities.

Mankato Area Community Education, Cultural Dance Performance - \$3,000. They will host the Hmong dance group Pan Asian Arts Alliance performing their Colorful Asia program at Lincoln Community Center, October 14, 2021, at 6 p.m. The performance will be free and open to the public. This event in in conjunction with the Hmong dance group performing at the Global Connections Conference at South Central College early that day.

<u>Waseca Marching Classic - \$1,980</u>. They will sponsor educational clinics for student marching band participants during the Waseca Marching Classic, September 18, 2021. Student bands from several communities are anticipated as participants in the clinics.



FY 2022 Arts and Cultural Heritage Grant

Deadlines are: Aug. 1 and Feb. 1

Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council will fund projects from non-profit tax-exempt 501c3 arts organizations or those using a fiscal sponsor that are producing or sponsoring an arts activity in dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art. This includes arts and music festivals, community bands and choirs, theatre events, dance activities, literary readings, public art, visual arts exhibitions and classes, etc. **No specific cash match is required.**

ACH Large Arts Organization Stability Grant. Arts Programming and Access – maximum request \$13,000. Eligibility: They must be a 501c3 Arts Organization that has year-round arts programming, has paid staff, and owns their building (or have a yearly lease for performance space).

<u>ACH Arts Project Grant</u>. Arts Programming and Access – maximum request \$8,000.

Funds may be used for Arts programming that is in-person or virtual. Expenses may include artist fees, artist travel, salaries, equipment, technology, training, promotion, monthly rent (lease payments) and utilities.


ACH Arts & Music Festivals Grant. Maximum request \$6,000. For non-profit tax-exempt 501c3 arts organizations that are sponsoring arts/music festivals and activities that represent diverse ethnic and cultural arts traditions.

ACH Education Grant. Maximum request \$6,000. For arts education programs by non-profit community groups and schools. This may include arts classes, author reading, artist residencies, live art performances, mini-workshops, or arts related field trips for schools.

ACH Youth Scholarship.

Youth Scholarship for Students (grades 7-12) – \$300, and (grades 3-6) - \$200. Students have the opportunity to study their chosen art with a practicing professional artist by taking lessons over a period of months. This is for all Art disciplines. Deadline for grades 7-12 is October 1; and grades 3-6 is November 1.





Small Arts Project Grant

Non-profit arts organizations, community groups, or public organizations producing or sponsoring arts activities for their community are eligible. The grant may be up to \$2,000. BIPOC projects can apply for up to \$3,000. Fundable activities include: arts and music festivals, community bands and choirs, theatre events, dance activities, literary readings, public art, visual arts exhibitions and classes, etc. **Deadline:** July 1, and the 1st of each month until May.

School Arts Project Grant

Grants are for schools K-12 public and private. Grants up to \$2,000 are available to fund Artist residencies, live art performances, mini-workshops or arts related field trips. Deadline: July 1, and the 1st of each month until May.

Artist Development Grant \$1,500

Artist Grants are for a specific project that contributes directly to their artistic growth and professional development in dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art. Funds may be used for supplies, matting and framing, equipment, attending a workshop, studio time, studying with a mentor, artist time, and/or living expenses.

Deadline: **September 1**Earliest start date: October 1

The applicant or organization must have an address and provide arts programming within the Prairie Lakes region; the counties are: Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca, or Watonwan County.

FY 2022 PLRAC GRANT DEADLINES

<u>Organizational Grants</u> - Non-profit arts organizations, community groups, schools, or public organizations producing or sponsoring arts activities for their community are eligible. Fundable projects may include: community choirs & bands, dance activities, literary readings, music presentations, theatre productions, visual arts classes and exhibitions, folk and traditional art, etc. Maximums for the Arts and Cultural Heritage grants vary, please check guidelines for details.

<u>Organizations can only receive one grant per year</u>. We encourage arts projects for BIPOC arts and cultural activities and underserved populations.



Artists: Do you need funds to create new work? We can help!

Artist Development Grants of \$1,500 are Available.

Prairie Lakes will be continuing the \$1,500 Artist Development Grant program in FY 2022. This will allow more artists to apply for funding and will provide more flexible support. Applications are encouraged from artists in all art disciplines. This may include dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional arts, etc.

The Artist Development Grant of \$1,500 has a deadline of September 1, 2021, with the earliest starting date of October 1, 2021. *The application is available online at www.plrac.org*.

This \$1,500 project grant provides financial support to artists committed to advancing their work and careers. Artists at all stages of development are eligible. Artists may expand their present work, advance in skill or technique, or move in a new direction.

Applicants must have resided in Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca, or Watonwan County for a minimum of twelve months prior to application.

This grant is for a specific project that contributes directly to your growth and development as a professional. Funds may be used for art supplies, materials, equipment, mentorships, workshops, creative time, living expenses, etc.

Artists: Do you need funds to create new work?

Prairie Lakes will continue to offer Artist Development Grants at \$1,500 in FY 2022. The deadline is September 1st and we anticipate that 33 individual artists can be awarded funds, totaling \$49,500. Funds are provided by the McKnight Foundation, noted Brenda Byron, Executive Director.

We encourage Artists to think about applying. To get you started, here are a few of the questions in the online application:

- 1. <u>Project Description</u>. Describe the project you will carry out with the grant funds. Provide as much detail as possible, including what, where and when. Provide details about the timeline associated with the project.
- 2. <u>Describe Your Career As An Artist (Past Experience)</u>

- 3. <u>Describe Where You Are Now as an Artist</u> (Present Experience)
- 4. <u>Describe Your Career Goals as an Artist</u> (Future Experiences)
- 5. <u>How Is This Project Going To Help in Your Career Development?</u>
- 6. <u>Artist Statement</u>. An artist statement is text that accompanies and explains the artist's intentions of their body of work.

The following documents are also needed:

- Artistic Resume
- Work Samples
- Work Sample Description Page

Prairie Lakes Updated our Mission and Value Statements in 2021

The Prairie Lakes board met several times in 2020 to discuss updates to their Mission Statement and Value Statements. It has been a few years since the mission statement has been revised. Since we were doing planning for FY 2022-23 it seemed like a good time to revisit this topic. Members provided information and feedback about the need to simplify the mission statement and to create some new value statements that would clarify the different categories we are trying to address through our arts grant programs and services. We were pleased with the outcome and everyone was comfortable with the updated information, which was approved at the January 2021 board meeting.

Mission Statement

The Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council serves the artistic communities of the 9-county area of southcentral MN by supporting the creation and presentation of diverse art forms, fostering equitable access to arts opportunities, and integrating arts and culture to enhance quality of life in our communities.

We value: The Arts, Artistic Merit, Creativity, Community, Accessibility, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion.



Value Statements:

The Arts

We value all forms of artistic expression, and resist the notion that there is but one universal definition of art or one best type of art. Instead, we embrace all artistic disciplines, genres, and subgenres, and encourage work that uses imagination, emotion, and craft to communicate.

Artistic Merit

We value artistic merit that promotes growth and development of creative knowledge, skills and understanding.

Creativity

The Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council (PLRAC) recognizes arts and culture as inherent and vital aspects of life. Art is a proven proponent of healthy, balanced, and prosperous communities. We are committed to closing access gaps in the arts with urgency and accountability. We believe sustained impact requires authentic relationships and transformative work, and to this end we are deeply invested. As stewards of public funds, including those allocated by the Legacy Amendment, PLRAC embraces the unique opportunity to ensure that all residents of the ninecounty area have access to quality arts experiences. We celebrate our region as an artistic cultural hub where artists and community members from all walks of life intersect. PLRAC dedicates its work to providing key support at these vital intersections where art and community align. PLRAC is committed to engaging in the relationship building, self-reflection, community discourse, and hands-on work imperative to make our region a place where all artistic communities can thrive.

PLRAC will focus our resources to educate ourselves, modify our practices and shift our own organizational culture to challenge racial disparities as we move toward equitable arts communities. We embrace our responsibility to lead racial equity work in funding, while informing and learning from equity and inclusion in the artistic practices and programming of our constituents.

The Prairie Lakes Equity Taskforce Members Concluded their Meetings in April 2021.

The Prairie Lakes Equity Taskforce meetings concluded in April and we are thankful to the six community members that participated. A diverse group of BIPOC individuals participated (Black, Latinx, and Native American), two people from the disability community, and one person who works with at-risk youth. It should also be noted that three members of the Executive Committee participated in these five meetings and were considered as members of the Taskforce. In addition, the three Prairie Lakes staff members participated, and minutes were compiled for each meeting.

It was nice to get to know these individuals and discuss equity and inclusion topics. We really appreciated their time to learn about our non-profit organization and make suggestions on how Prairie Lakes can adjust our systems and processes to identify barriers that underserved communities have in participating with us.

Prairie Lakes was able to create more inclusive language in our grant application guidelines based

upon suggestions from the group. More importantly, we learned more about listening and hearing how others perceive our organization.

"We have made some small steps forward on our journey of understanding how our organization can be more inclusive in our programming, and these individuals were part of that journey," noted Brenda Byron.

This is a great opportunity to understand the workings of the granting process, to be more involved with the arts and artists of our region, and to enjoy camaraderie with others who appreciate the arts. The Council seeks to appoint people who represent a cross-section of art forms as well as various arts perspectives: Artists, teachers, and representatives of arts organizations. Since a primary function of the Council is to serve as a panel for arts project applications, members are chosen for their knowledge, expertise, and involvement in the arts in the areas of dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art.

Volunteer board members serve a three year term. Monthly evening meetings are typically held the fourth Thursday of the month in Mankato, at Bethany Lutheran College. The monthly meetings have been conducted as online meetings this year and will continue virtually until further notice. Attendance at several PLRAC funded arts events per year is required and board members are reimbursed for their mileage to meetings and arts events.


