Youth Scholarships Available for Students taking Art, Music, and Dance Lessons who live in the 9-county area

Deadlines: October 1 & November 1, 2022

Grades 7-12 apply October 1st and Grades 3-6 apply November 1st.



The Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council is offering \$300 Arts Scholarships for Youth in grades 7–12, and \$200 for students in grades 3-6, who live in the 9-county area. <u>Students can apply for funds to take lessons and classes with an instructor over a period of months, etc.</u> Artistic areas include: dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art. **The application deadline for grades 7-12 is October 1, 2022 and for grades 3-6 the deadline is November 1, 2022.** There is only one deadline per year. Students must live in the nine-county region that Prairie Lakes serves including: Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca and Watonwan Counties.

These scholarships are competitive, for students that are active and excelling in their art form; and are being rewarded for their goals, ambitions, and achievement. The on-going learning component of the lessons, classes, etc. is an important factor. Lessons can be conducted inperson or online via Skype, Zoom, or other live platforms.

Students in grades 7-12 must be participating with an instructor, an organization or arts discipline for at least 2 years to be eligible. Students in grades 3-6 must be participating for at least one year to be eligible. Both age groups require an online letter of recommendation from a teacher as part of their application. The scholarship can be used to take lessons and pay a private Instructor or pay fees to a non-profit arts organization serving youth such as: Area Art Centers, Dance Conservatory of Southern MN, Mankato Area Youth Symphony Orchestra, Mankato Ballet Company, Mankato Children's Chorus, or New Ulm Suzuki School of Music, other youth dance or music organizations, or art centers and groups which offer art classes to youth, etc. <u>Scholarships are paid directly to the teacher or</u> <u>organization providing the lessons</u>. Students may not use this scholarship to participate in a school or organization band or choir trip, or other arts trips.

Prairie Lakes values an equitable, diverse, and inclusive community and this is reflected in our policies and program for youth. We encourage Black, Indigenous and Students of Color to apply, also those who have financial need, or have a disability.

Prairie Lakes has an online application process. Visit our website, <u>www.plrac.org</u> and click on the applicant Login button. Follow the instructions to register as an artist for the Youth Scholarship and complete the application. In FY 2022 a total of 108 students were awarded Youth Scholarships, for a total of \$27,300 from the Arts and <u>Cultural Heritage Fund</u>. This is part of the Legacy funding from the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment that Prairie Lakes receives from the State Legislature.



Artist Grants totaling \$44,000 were Awarded to 22 Artists from the Area

We are pleased that twenty-two artists were each awarded a \$2,000 Artist Development Grant. We are excited that these artists will be creating new works in a variety of media, and they include eleven visual artists, six literary artists, three musicians, one dancer, and one media artist.

Artists are using the funds for a variety of needs which may include art supplies, matting and framing, equipment, attending a workshop, studio time, using a mentor or an editor, artist creative time or living expenses, etc. We hope that other artists will be inspired and plan to apply for a future grant from Prairie Lakes, and the next deadline will be September 2023.

Artists represent six different counties, including 11 artists from Blue Earth County, 5 from Nicollet County, 2 from Brown County, 2 from Waseca County, 1 from Faribault County, and 1 from Martin County. The artists are listed below in alphabetical order along with their project descriptions.

<u>Angela Anderson, New Ulm</u>. Angela is a musician and will use the grant to perform her original music in the Mankato area and to record original songs for a CD or online streaming service.

<u>Juana Arias, St. Peter</u>. Juana is a visual artist and will use the grant to implement screen printing into her 3D ceramic process, including drawing, burning, and printing to prepare the transfers.

<u>Vicki Beckendorf, Odin</u>. Vicki is a visual artist and will use the grant to expand her skills in nature painting. She will experiment with watercolor and oil paint in both small and large sizes and combine multiple scenes into one fantasy design.

<u>Virginia Bergerson, Janesville</u>. Virginia is a visual artist and will use the grant to frame her original mixed media paintings and create prints of the work to accommodate selling then at larger shows and artisan fairs. She will also update her website.

<u>Yvonne Cory, Easton</u>. Yvonne is a visual artist and will use the grant to create a website to document the legacy of her fiber apron artistry and vintage apron program series called "Joys and Tears in the Apron Strings".

<u>Wade Davis, Mankato</u>. Wade is a visual artist and will use the grant to create a series of multicolor woodcut and linocut prints that celebrate his youth and an exploration of nostalgia about growing up in the 1980's through relief printmaking.

<u>Craig Groe, Mankato</u>. Craig is a visual artist and will use the grant to create and exhibit two large scale paintings that will be 6 feet by 7.5 feet in size.

<u>Connor Hopkins, Mankato</u>. Connor is a musician and will use the grant to create a short album of original music titled "Where Are We Going". He will also perform locally with a combination of recorded electronic sound and live instrumentation.

<u>Rachael Jaeger, Mankato</u>. Rachael is a writer and will use the grant to continue working with an editor to complete her book "The David Project: The Forgotten".

<u>Tinner Johnson, Mankato</u>. Tinner is a visual artist and will use the grant to create a collection of twenty art dolls to be sold at the Mankato Makerspace Maker Market. She will learn new skills, upgrade her equipment, and launch a website.

<u>Andrea Lynn, New Ulm</u>. Andrea is a musician and will use the grant to complete an album with eight original songs. She will spend time creating the last three songs, recording the music in a studio, and creating a professionally produced music video.

Jerry Mollenhauer, St. Peter.

Jerry is a writer and will use the grant to have the final edit completed for his World War II novel "The Death of Angels", work on the 2^{nd} draft of his crime novel "First Ice-Out", and to work on a book-length compendium of short stories showing the adverse effects of climate change.

Jim Muyres, Mankato. Jim is a writer and will use the grant to develop as a fiction writer by creating four pieces varying in length. He will also take two classes at The Loft in Minneapolis, "Getting Your Word Out: Polishing, Submitting, and Marketing Your Writing" and "Submitting to Paid Literary Markets".

<u>Charles Putnam, St. Peter</u>. Charles is a visual artist and will use the grant to create a series of ceramic and multimedia two-dimensional images to exhibit and sell, using a variety of relief printmaking techniques and potential digital applications.

<u>Tracy Ross, Mankato</u>. Tracy is a writer and will use the grant to make a transition from poetry to non-fiction. She will be writing "Ragged Edges of Reason", a collection of essays exploring how the challenges in her life shaped her insights about the importance of nature, empathy, transformation, and expression.

Evan Ryan, North Mankato. Evan is a film maker and will use the grant to create fully-rigged, "game-ready" 3D humanoid models for use in film, game, simulation, and other new media applications over the next year.

<u>Colin Scharf, Mankato</u>. Colin is a visual artist and will use the grant to produce a series of enlarged prints of Polaroid photos that he took during the 2020 Covid-19 lockdown. He will exhibit the prints at multiple galleries in the region throughout 2023. <u>Julia Snelson, Mankato</u>. Julia is a visual artist and will use the grant to attend two clay workshops; The Advanced Raku Workshop in Willamina, Oregon and the Weber Woodfire Workshop in Herbster, Wisconsin. She will also share what she learns through a community education program.

<u>Molly Stoltz, St. Peter</u>. Molly is a dancer and will use the grant to take online classes from three master teachers in tap and flamenco dancing.

<u>James Sullivan, Mankato</u>. James is a writer and will use the grant to push his short story collection, "Harboring", to publication. He will also submit individual short stories to journals and magazines.

Robin Warburton, Janesville.

Robin is a visual artist and will use the grant to create six carved 6-inch flammulated owls out of wood. The series will show the steps she uses to create a wooden sculpture, with the six owls being at different stages of the artistic process. She will exhibit the series at the Waseca Art Center in April 2023.

Jason Willis, Mapleton.

Jason is a writer and will use the grant to publish "The Alchemist's Ring", the third novel in his series.

Arts and Cultural Heritage Grants Awarded A total of \$148,000 was awarded to 22 Area Organizations

The Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council is pleased to announce that Arts and Cultural Heritage grants of \$148,000 were awarded to twenty-two arts organizations in the region on August 25, 2022. The organizations are listed alphabetically with a brief description of their artistic activities and events.

The grants are for arts activities in all artistic disciplines. A variety of activities including instrumental and vocal music concerts, theater and dance performances, exhibitions, festivals, and classes for youth and adults are being funded. This fund was created by the people of Minnesota to support the arts and preserve our heritage. The Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment, passed by the voters in Nov. 2008, created new resources for land conservation, water conservation, parks and the Arts. <u>The next ACH Grant deadline is February 1, 2023</u>. Organizations can apply once per year for this grant.

Arlington Chamber of Commerce, ArliDazzle -<u>\$5,000</u>. They will sponsor the annual ArliDazzle celebration, including music and entertainment from ice sculpting artists, DeCantus Christmas Carolers, Frozen Characters, the Amazing Hoopsters Dance, Mariachi music, and the Shell's Hobo Band Quartet on December 3, 2022. Funds will be used for artists fees.

Arts Center of Saint Peter - \$7,000. They will provide gallery exhibitions, a Holiday Market for artists, outdoor music performances, and educational classes; September 2022 through June 2023. Funds will be used for artist fees, publicity, and facility costs.

Blue Earth Valley Concert Association - \$7,000. They will sponsor their 2022-23 subscription series of music concerts at the Blue Earth Area Schools Performing Arts Center, October 2022-April 2023. The concerts will include several different music genres. Funds will be used for artist fees.

DalekoArts, New Prague - \$7,000. They will present their 11th main stage season that includes three musical productions: "Irving Berlin's White Christmas", "Chris Smith's White Chrismith", and "Bright Star". Funds will be used for pit orchestra fees.

Davori Productions, Mankato Playhouse - \$7,000. They will produce high quality in-person musical theater performances for the 2022-23 season. Funds will be used to pay stipends to support the Teen Broadway program and the new Teen Masters program. Shows will include "Chicago Teen Edition", "Anything Goes", and "Junie B Jones". **Fairmont Opera House - \$7,000.** They will present their 2022-23 season of high-quality performances and events. Funds will be used to pay artist fees and publicity for the Brazilian violin duo B2wins, performing April 14, 2023.

La Grande Bande, Gaylord - \$7,000. They will present their concert season of Baroque and Romantic era music, September 2022 through May 2023. They will also conduct multiple masterclass sessions with high school students, host open rehearsals and pre-concert talks, and outreach concerts for those not able to physically attend a season concert. Funds will be used for artist fees, publicity, and rental fees.

Mankato/North Mankato ACT on Alzheimer's -<u>\$7,000</u>. They will sponsor the Singing Hills Chorus, a singing group made up of people with Alzheimer's disease or related dementias and their care partners. They facilitate two chorus sessions and concerts, one in the fall and one in the spring. They also offer free monthly Summer SingAlongs. Funds will be used for artist fees, salaries, and publicity.

Mankato Area Youth Symphony Orchestra - \$7,000. They will present multiple concerts during their 2022-23 season with opportunities for students to participate with the Youth Symphony Orchestra, Youth Philharmonic, North Star Strings, Chamber Strings, Pop Orchestra, and Jazz. Funds will be used for scholarships, director salaries, venue rentals, music, and publicity.

Mankato Children's Chorus - \$5,000. The choirs consisting of students in grades 1-12, will hold weekly rehearsals and present two concerts in the fall and spring of 2022-23. Funds will be used for directors' salaries.

Mankato Makerspace - \$7,000. They will sponsor the "Makerspace Artists of Tomorrow" project, which is a program of weekly youth arts classes for students in grades 6-12. Scholarships will be available. Funds will be used for artist stipends, salaries, and supplies.

Martin Co. Preservation, Assoc. (Red Rock Center for the Arts) - \$7,000. They will sponsor their 2022-23 season of arts programming; including the "Lunch with the Arts" series; arts experiences for children and adults; and musical concerts including Alma Andina performing Andean and Latin American music at an in-house concert and an outreach program at a local school. Funds will be used for artist fees, art class supplies, salaries, and publicity.

<u>Merely Players Community Theatre - \$7,000</u>. They will present their 2022-2023 season of plays in Mankato, including: "Winnie the Pooh", "The Nerd", and "Oklahoma" held at Lincoln Community Center and "Cabaret" at the Kato Ballroom. Funds will be used for artist fees, publicity, and production expenses.

Minnesota New Country School - \$5,000. They will provide ten art and cultural field trips for students during the 2022-23 school year to promote life-long appreciation of all art forms. Activities are divided among several grade levels and include Minneapolis Institute of Arts, Children's Theater, Park Square Theater, Guthrie Theater, Stages Theater, Walker Art Center, and a tour of Southern Minnesota Art Galleries. Funds will be used for ticket costs.

<u>Minnesota Valley Chorale - \$7,000</u>. They will perform four concerts in Mankato for the 2022-2023 season; two winter concerts in November and two spring concerts in April. Funds will be used for artist fees, membership scholarships, salaries, supplies, and venue rental.

<u>Musicorum, Mankato - \$7,000</u>. They will present their choral season with a holiday concert in December 2022 and a spring concert in April 2023. The concerts will be held at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Mankato. Funds will be used for the director's salary, instrumentalist stipends, publicity, venue rental, and to purchase music scores.

New Ulm Figure Skating Club - \$7,000. They will present their 2023 Ice Skating Show "Alice in Wonderland on Ice" in March 2023. Funds will be used for the show director's fee and ice time rental.

Project G.E.M. - \$7,000. The Growth, Experience & Motivation Project will provide arts education program activities to at risk youth, ages 6-19, in Blue Earth and Nicollet Counties in 2022-23. This includes instruction in art and drama in a variety of locations, taught by college students going in the education field. Funds will be used for artist fees, travel expenses, salaries, and supplies.

ProMusica Minnesota - \$7,000. They will host their series of three high quality chamber music concerts in New Ulm. "Strings Attached" on September 25, 2022; "Lunar New Year" on January 29, 2023; and "Brahms F Minor Piano Quintet" on March 26, 2023. The guest musicians will also lead free masterclasses and lectures at area schools. Funds will be used for artist fees.

South Central Service Cooperative - \$7,000. They will host the Young Writers & Artists Conference March 7-8, 2023 for students in grades 3-8, at Bethany Lutheran College, Mankato. Students can participate in a variety of subjects related to writing and creative arts. Funds will be used for artist stipends and student scholarships.

State Street Theater Company, New Ulm - \$7,000. They will present their 2022-23 season including the production of "Rocky Horror Picture Show" in October 2022 and four booked shows including the U.S. Army Jazz Ambassadors, The Brit Concert, Ballet Folklorica Mexico, and Church of Cash. Funds will be used for artist fees, production costs, and to update their website.

<u>Waseca Arts Council - \$7,000</u>. They will sponsor exhibitions and classes throughout 2023. They plan to add a ceramics studio in the basement of the art center and begin offering ceramics classes. Funds will be used to purchase three pottery wheels.

Small Arts Project and School Arts Project Grants Awarded in September Totaling \$12,300

Our Small Arts Project and School Arts Project Grant program funds non-profit arts organizations, community groups, public organizations, or schools producing or sponsoring arts activities for their community or students. Six Small Arts grants were awarded totaling \$12,300.

We encourage applications for artistic performances or the sponsorship of quality arts activities in the 9-county region. This may include dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art, etc.

<u>Betsy Tacy Society (SA) - \$2,500.</u> They will sponsor a mural of a book illustration to be painted by Bethany College students on the Deep Valley Properties building and host their Victorian Christmas event at the Betsy Tacy houses in Mankato. Funds will be used for artist fees, supplies, and salaries.

<u>GSR Fine Art Festival (SA) - \$2,500.</u> They will host the festival to provide artists a regional venue to sell their goods during the holiday season. The festival will be held November 26-27, 2022, at the Mayo Clinic Health System Event Center in Mankato. Musicians will also play throughout the two-days. Funds will be used for artist fees.



<u>Open Arts Minnesota (SA) - \$2,500</u>. They will support the United We Stand Players of New Ulm to stage an original play called "Weaving Our Stories Together". The play is a collection of stories written by the actors with disabilities. The play will be staged November 12, 2022 at the New Ulm Community Center. Funds will be used for publicity, rental fees, salaries, sets, costumes, props, and an ASL interpreter.

<u>Park Elementary School, LeSueur (SCH) - \$1,250</u>. They will host the the Youth Dance Ensemble and School from Burnsville to perform the Nutcracker Ballet for K-5 students at Park Elementary and St. Anne's School. Funds will be used for artist fees and transportation.

St. Clair Public School, Instrumental Music (SCH) -<u>\$2,500</u>. They will host an artist-in-residency with percussion specialist, Michelle Roche. She will work specifically with percussion students in grades 5-12 through private lessons, mini-group sessions, and large group rehearsals. The residency will conclude with a performance for all students and the public by the school percussionists and Michelle Roche. Funds will be used for artist fees.

<u>Waseca Latino Cultural Celebration (SA) - \$1,050.</u> They will host the Cultural Celebration featuring a Mexican Mariachi band called Mariachi America from St. Paul; December 10, 2022. Funds will be used for artist fees and publicity



FY 2023 Arts and Cultural Heritage Grant Deadlines are: August 1 and February 1

Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council will fund projects from non-profit tax-exempt 501c3 arts organizations or those using a fiscal sponsor that are producing or sponsoring an arts activity in dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art. This includes arts and music festivals, community bands and choirs, theatre events, dance activities, literary readings, public art, visual arts exhibitions and classes, etc. **No specific cash match is required.**

<u>ACH Arts Project Grant</u>. Arts Programming and Access – maximum request \$7,000.

Funds may be used for Arts programming that is in-person or virtual. Expenses may include artist fees, artist travel, salaries, equipment, technology, training, promotion, monthly rent (lease payments) and utilities.


ACH Arts & Music Festivals Grant. Maximum request \$5,000. For non-profit tax-exempt 501c3 arts organizations that are sponsoring arts/music festivals and activities that represent diverse ethnic and cultural arts traditions.

ACH Education Grant. Maximum request \$5,000. For arts education programs by non-profit community groups and schools. This may include arts classes, author reading, artist residencies, live art performances, mini-workshops, or arts related field trips for schools.

ACH Youth Scholarship.

Youth Scholarship for Students (grades 7-12) – \$300, and (grades 3-6) - \$200. Students have the opportunity to study their chosen art with a practicing professional artist by taking lessons over a period of months. This is for all Art disciplines. Deadline for grades 7-12 is October 1; and grades 3-6 is November 1.





Small Arts Project Grant

Non-profit arts organizations, community groups, or public organizations producing or sponsoring arts activities for their community are eligible. The <u>grant</u> <u>may be up to \$2,500. BIPOC projects can apply for</u> <u>up to \$4,000.</u> Fundable activities include: arts and music festivals, community bands and choirs, theatre events, dance activities, literary readings, public art, visual arts exhibitions and classes, etc. **Deadline: July 1, and the 1st of each month until April.**

School Arts Project Grant

Grants are for schools K-12 public and private. Grants up to \$2,500 are available to fund Artist residencies, live art performances, mini-workshops or arts related field trips. Deadline: July 1, and the 1st of each month until April.

Artist Development Grant \$2,000

Artist Grants are for a specific project that contributes directly to their artistic growth and professional development in dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual art, folk and traditional art. Funds may be used for supplies, matting and framing, equipment, attending a workshop, studio time, studying with a mentor, artist time, and/or living expenses.

Deadline: September 1 Earliest start date: October 1

The applicant or organization must have an address and provide arts programming within the Prairie Lakes region; the counties are: Blue Earth, Brown, Faribault, LeSueur, Martin, Nicollet, Sibley, Waseca, or Watonwan County.

<u>Organizational Grants</u> - Non-profit arts organizations, community groups, schools, or public organizations producing or sponsoring arts activities for their community are eligible. Fundable projects may include: community choirs & bands, dance activities, literary readings, music presentations, theatre productions, visual arts classes and exhibitions, folk and traditional art, etc. Maximums for the Arts and Cultural Heritage grants vary, please check guidelines for details.

Small Arts Project Grant maximum is \$2,500 and BIPOC cultural arts project may request up to \$4,000. PLRAC is interested in receiving new applications for BIPOC cultural activities that engage the public.

Artist Grants - Are for specific projects that will advance your work and arts career.
